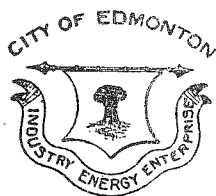

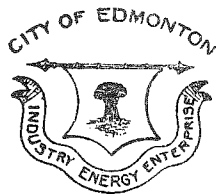

Gentlemen:-

With reference to the permission granted to the Klu Klux Klan to hold a picnic in the Exhibition Grounds and Grand Stand on July 5th, I wish to point out that on the last occasion this organization held a picnic in the same premises fiery crosses were burned.

While not interested in the Klan or its doings, yet, as Fire Chief, I think it right to call attention to the danger of any fire being lit on the Exhibition Grounds. It is contrary to the City By-laws and in the event of there being a high wind, the danger of fire would be very great and, as you know, the Exhibition buildings are frame structures, thus increasing the hazard.

While the Fire Department will do their utmost to prevent any danger of fire and must, of course, submit to the Commissioners' ruling, yet I wish to go on record as being opposed to this permission being granted on this occasion except on the distinct understanding that no fires of any kind will be lit during the picnic.
